Forenoon speakers were Miss Viola Brandt, rural school supervisor, and Mr. Basil Merian, Conservation Commission field man. Miss Brandt spoke on "Understanding the Child", a theme which is to be stressed this year in the schools of Missouri.

Mr. Merian demonstrated how the teaching of conservation of our natural resources can be taught in co-ordination with other elementary school subjects.

After the noon hour, Mrs. David Browning, representing the Parent-Teacher Ass'n. of north-east Missouri, emphasized the importance to school children of P. T. A. organizations in rural districts.

Guy Kerby, Sr., president of the Schuyler County Board of Education, spoke on reorganization of schools, its purpose and the ends accomplished throughout the state of Missouri, in 1929.

No inquest is planned by Coroner Davis.

Funeral services for John Hatfield will be held at the Dee Riley Funeral Home in Kirkville this afternoon at two o'clock. Elder Clyde Johnson will officiate. Burial will be in the Greentop Cemetery.

Hatfield was the son of Everett E. and Hattie (Byrd) Hatfield and was born in Schuyler County, Nov. 10, 1903.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Everett E. Hatfield, of Greentop, and one sister, Mrs. Clarence (Lucille) Hughes of Kirkville.

He was a veteran of World War II.

Bearers will be Forrest Western, Oscar Western, Boyd Western, Carl Western, George Hatfield and John Western.

Mrs. Hatfield was the daughter of Albert and Eva (Broadfield) Burkhardt and was born east of Greentop, March 13, 1913. She is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Burkhardt, of Greentop, Mo.; one brother Harold, living east of Greentop, three sisters, Mrs. Willard (Evelyn) Byrd, Greentop, Mrs. Floyd (Alberta) McElhinney, Kirkville, and Mrs. Harold (Henrietta) Urton, Denver, Colo.

She was a member of the Greentop Christian Church.

PAINTER KILLS BRIDE THEN SHOOTSELF

John G. ("Peck") Hatfield, 46, and his wife, Virginia, 31, of southwest of Millard were dead today after a murder-suicide and a love triangle had taken their lives Friday night between five and six o'clock.

Hatfield shot his wife at about 3:45 p. m. Friday at their home about three and a half miles southwest of Millard after "family trouble," Adair County Coroner Robert B. Davis said today and about 15 minutes later turned the gun on himself in the driveway of the Minor Martin home about a mile north of Kirkville.

According to the story pieced together by officials, the couple had quarreled at their home Friday afternoon with the result that Hatfield shot his bride of slightly more than two months in the left side of the chest with a pistol of foreign make, about .38 calibre. She apparently died immediately.

Mrs. Hatfield's eight-year-old nephew, who was fishing at the pond near the house, heard the shot and came to the house but Hatfield would not let him in. Hatfield came out of the house and took the boy in his car to the home of his wife's sister and husband, the boy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Floyd McElhinney, about 2 1/2 miles away on Highway 43. He let the boy out here and told the McElhinneys that he had killed his wife.

He told them also that he intended to kill himself but Mr. McElhinney thought he "had him talked out of it" and Hatfield left, saying he was going to Greentop. He stopped, however, in the driveway of Minor Martin a mile and a half south of Kirkville.

Mr. Martin told officers that Hatfield had told him that he had killed his wife and that he would wait there until the officials came. He told Martin to go back into the house. Mr. Martin complied with his wishes and called Adair County Sheriff G. E. Grossnickle who started at once for the scene. Martin said that he went to the house window and looked out at the car but could see no one in it so he approached the vehicle and opened the door. Hatfield had shot himself through the right temple.

Though Hatfield was still living when Martin first saw that he had shot himself and called an ambulance, he died before a doctor could reach him.

Coroner Robert B. Davis said today that Hatfield left a note explaining his actions which were attributed to jealousy and quarreling.

PLANE CRASHES AT MURRELL FARM NORTH OF LANCASTER

A plane, owned and flown by a Mr. McDonald of St. Louis, Mo., crashed at the Sam Murrell farm north of Lancaster, Thursday, Aug. 3.

Mr. McDonald was enroute to Kirksville to visit friends when he encountered a storm over Shelbyville, and missed Kirksville.

Visibility being very poor he flew on north until he was over the barn at the home of Junior Shepherd when his gasoline supply became exhausted. In an attempt to make a forced landing he circled the Murrell out field trying to land on it. As he made a two-point landing, one wing caught on the ground and the plane nosed over, damaging the landing gear, propeller and engine.

Forrest Coad and Junior Shepherd observed the crash and hurried to the scene to help. When they arrived, however, Mr. McDonald was climbing out of the wreckage, uninjured but shaky. The plane was repaired by a mechanic from Kirksville.

As a group, American farmers enjoy a reputation for being able to protect their own interests. They are especially suspicious of any meddling in their business deal. That's why there's a growing belief that some Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Missouri farmers have not been given all the facts about the latest deal public ownership advocates have cooked up for them.

The public ownership boys say the farmers are completely in favor of the proposed conversion of the Southwestern Power Administration and groups of the area's rural electric cooperatives. They also say it is a very good deal for the farmers. And, to date, none of the farmers involved has seriously challenged either of these statements.

Yet, there are lots of "traps" from the viewpoint of the farm co-ops in their arrangements with SPA. First, even if they are not technically illegal, the agreements are based on obviously shaky moral foundations.

The deal calls for groups of co-ops to borrow Rural Electrification Administration funds for construction of steam generating plants and extensive transmission systems. The co-ops then will lease the bulk of these facilities to SPA, which also gets an option to buy them. Promoters of this scheme insist that Congress never has refused SPA funds to build precisely these facilities. The fact is that Congress definitely and fully refused to give SPA any funds for steam plants or for similar, if not exactly identical, transmission lines.

Congress has voted billions to help farmers obtain central station electric service. But the taxpayers have a legitimate protest when co-ops

use the low-cost federal money made available to them to put another federal agency into a business from which it had been specifically barred by Congress.

But there are even more obvious drawbacks for the co-ops. First, under contracts for power, with SPA the latter agency will lease the co-ops facilities at rentals sufficient to pay off the REA loans in 35 years. But the co-ops—not SPA—will be in debt and tied to the federal government for that long period even though they pay off loans on their distribution systems sooner.

The contracts also lock the co-ops to SPA as their major, if not sole, source of power supply for 40 years. And they must buy power at SPA's going rates—not at a fixed charge. SPA rates may be attractive today. But they are fixed to pay out the power investments at only two hydro plants from which SPA now sells power; Additional and much more expensive plants soon will be producing power for SPA. And that agency may have to increase its rates—as Bureau of Public Administration is talking of doing in order to pay out the power costs of expensive new plants in the Northwest.

In that event, where can the co-ops go if they do not like the new rates? Not to their state utility commissions which have no jurisdiction over federal power. Nor to the Federal Power Commission which can only approve—not reduce—SPA rates under existing law.

The co-ops also become political attachments of SPA in its battle to spread public power in the Southwest. This is, in the least, ironic for organizations which long have insisted they are sales of free, private enterprise.

Cumulative Attendance Notice

Every Parent, Guardian or other person in this state having charge, control or custody of a child between the ages of 7 and 14 years, shall cause such child to attend regular some day school, public, private, parochial or parish, not less than the entire time the school which such child attends is in session, or shall provide such child at home with such regular daily instruction during the usual hours as shall in the judgement of the court of competent jurisdiction be substantially equivalent at least of the instruction given children of like age at said school in the locality which said child resides, and every person in this state having charge or custody of a child between the ages of 14 and 18 years, who is not actually and regularly and lawfully engaged at least six hours each day in some useful employment, shall cause said child to attend regular some day school aforesaid, provided that a child may be excused temporarily by the attendance officers or court of competent jurisdiction is shown to the satisfaction of said parties that said child is mentally and physically unable to attend, or that said child has completed the common school course and received certificate of graduation thereof.
