**LIVESTOCK ASSOCIATION  
ADOPTS SERIES OF  
RESOLUTIONS**

The Missouri Livestock Association rejected any system of controls that would restrict red meat production in a resolution passed at their recent annual meeting at Columbia.

The resolution said any restriction in production would be handing over to other food products a part of the sales volume that otherwise would go to red meat. "Over the years, this would be too great a price to pay for the doubtful benefits from an artificial and subsidized market," the

resolution read.

In a second resolution, the livestock producers asked that government programs not shift the problem of price-supported crops onto feed grains or in the direction of expanding grazing land on a subsidized basis.

The livestock producers, meeting at the University of Missouri Student Union, passed 13 resolutions on various subjects. One recommended that livestock producers be allowed to average their incomes over a period of years for tax purposes. Another asked the government to adopt a realistic policy of tariff or quota protection against excessive imports of foreign livestock and meats.

The Association, by resolution, welcomed the county feeder calf and pig associations into Association membership. It recommended that counties without some type of livestock association should form one to develop a program

of livestock improvement for their county. Such association could then affiliate with the state association and through it, the American National Cattleman's Association.

Still another resolution called for the Missouri Legislature to make funds available to build an Animal Science Research Building at the University of Missouri. This would permit increased emphasis on studies in the fields of nutrition, genetics, and animal diseases. Such research would benefit the state's livestock industry which provides about 75 percent of the total cash income of Missouri farmers.

Officers of the Association were re-elected for another year. They are J. R. Bartels, St. Mary's, president; and Dorsey Bass, Columbia, vice-president. J. W. Burch, Columbia, secretary-treasurer, was also reappointed.

One director was elected for a

two-year term from each of the eight Association districts. They are I. A. Lowry, Liberty; Chet Hill, Nevinger; Jack Palmer, McCredie; D. F. Clark, Salem; C. W. Sheppard, Warrensburg; Theodore Anderson, Montreal; Charles Fife, West Plains; and Ralph Romig, Perryville.

**LAND BANK ASSOCIATION  
DIRECTORS TO MEET IN  
COLUMBIA**

The directors and manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Kirksville will attend a group meeting in Columbia on August 30, of Missouri Associations in this area. The group will review the progress of the past year and make plans to best serve the long-term credit needs of Missouri farmers in the future. The Federal Land Bank of St. Louis serves farmers in Missouri, Illinois, and Arkansas through 68 Federal Land Bank Associations over the three states.

In announcing the meeting, Walter H. Driscoll, president, stated that the bank will continue to review changing conditions affecting long-term credit needs and the capacity to repay farm mortgage credit. Over the years appraisal standards for making Land Bank Loans have been revised to recognize the many improvements in farming that have made it possible for farmers to safely repay larger long-term debts. During the year ending June 30, 1959 the Federal Land Bank of St. Louis made 4,200 loans totaling \$47,915,000.

Charles Morse, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Kirksville, stated that he and the directors of the association have made plans for serving the long-term credit needs of as many farmers as possible in the association's territory.

The directors of the association are Roy E. Burchett of Kirksville, Charles H. Cook of Downing, Louis R. Roberts of Callao, Keweenaw, R. Phelps of Kirksville and William L. Collins of Laclette.

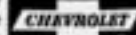
